
The numerous members of our old unit, that made it possible for the 377th Security Police Squadron to be designated as one of the most decorated unit's in the history of the United States Air Force.

October 1967 - July 1969

When I first arrived at the 377th SPS, I was assigned to night shift, Charlie Sector. TSgt Arthur Garcia was my NCOIC.

The shift, each night was actually very normal in most respects. We would be assigned to a different post each night, maintaining alert posture, for anything abnormal.


Then the abnormal came and it was called the "Tet Offensive." For the 377th SPS, it's duration would last from Jan 31 - Feb 18, 1968.

After the Tet Offensive, Foxtrot Sector needed some beefing up and I volunteered to go over there and guard the southern perimeter.

I know, "Never Volunteer."

In April 1968, I volunteered to go to the Sentry Dog Section.

I was given thirty day's of "OJT" training with my assigned sentry dog, REBEL A531.



I was a dog handler all during the Mini-Tet Offensive, May 6, 1968.

After Mini-Tet, I went Tachikawa, Japan, "TDY status" for thirty days.


The purpose was to pick up a brand new military working dog and bring him back to Tan Son Nhut Air Base.

I chose a male German shepherd, named SMOKEY M707, as my new

Once back at TSN, I then certified SMOKEY as a sentry dog and began working with him on a nightly basis.

In 1998, I decided to make the 377th SPS web pages.


This was done so that we could have a way for former members of the 377th SPS, to make contact with old friends, that they had lost over the years.

September 1967 - September 1968

Charles has a good point about not volunteering.

I was stationed at Kincheloe AFB, Michigan and the kennel master said, "Stewart, I need another dog handler and I sent your name in for dog school, in October."

I informed him that I was afraid of dogs. His response was "Hell, we'll get you a Chihuahua, you're still going."

I talked to some of the other dog handlers and they liked their duty, wandering around out in the woods rather that around B-52's. So I went.

Less than a year later, I had arrived in Vietnam.

I arrived at Tan Son Nhut Air Base, along with thirty other men who are K-9 handler's. I was assigned a good looking black German Shepherd named DOBE 7X49.

Jim Pearl and I had been in dog school together and Bob Rodocker and I had been to the AZR Combat Preparedness Course together, so I knew a couple of guys already.



After spending a year together the thirty of us were a band of brothers, forged by the fires of war, called the Tet Offensive of 1968.

Sometime in the 1980's, I thought it would be nice if I could locate a couple of guys from my Vietnam days.

The search was like a snowball that was rolling downhill.

In the past thirty years, I have now added almost 1100 men to the 377th Security Police Squadron's database.

We have had four of the 377th SPS Reunions with as many as four hundred people attending.

The icing on the cake, is that I have reconnected with twenty-seven of my "K-9 Brothers" at a variety of reunions.

When we get together we forget that forty plus years have gone by and we just enjoy each other.

If you haven't been to a reunion, you owe it to yourself to attend one.

Come as strangers and leave as friends!

Charles and I will see you there!

Presidential Unit Citation 31 Jan 1968 - 02 Feb 1968



Criteria: Awarded to U.S. Air Force units and allies for extraordinary heroism in action against an armed enemy on or after December 7, 1941 (marking the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor and the U.S. entrance into World War II.) The unit must display such gallantry, determination and spirit de corps in accomplishing it mission under extremely difficult and hazardous conditions so as to set it apart from and above other units participating in the same campaign. The degree of heroism required is the same as that which would warrant award of the Air Force Cross to an individual.

The citation was established as the Distinguished Unit Citation on February 26, 1942, and received its present name on November 3, 1966. All members of the unit may wear the decoration, whether or not they personally participated in the acts for which the unit was cited.

Only those assigned to the unit at the time of the action cited may wear the decoration as a permanent award.

For the Army and Air Force, the emblem itself is a solid blue ribbon enclosed in a gold frame.

The Citation is carried on the unit's regimental colors in the form of a blue streamer, four feet long and 2 3/4 inches wide.

<u>Criteria:</u> Awarded to any USAF Command performing exceptionally meritorious service, accomplish in specific acts of outstanding achievement, excelling in combat operations against an armed enemy of the United States, or exhibiting conduct with distinction in military operations involving conflict with or exposure to a hostile action by any opposing foreign force.

The award was created in 1954. Multiple awards of the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award are denoted by oak leaf clusters on the ribbon.

Until 2001, the Outstand Unit Award ranked directly below the Presidential Unit Citation on the precedence of Air Force Awards.

Note: This unit citation ribbon is one of the few awards issued by the military as a ribbon only. There is no accompanying medal.

National Defense Service Medal 1959 - 30 Apr 1975



<u>Criteria:</u> Awarded to anyone who serves on active duty in the United States military during a designated time period.

In fifty years since the creation of the National Defense Service Medal, it has been authorized for the following time periods; Jun 27, 1950 to Jul 27, 1954 for service during the Korean War.

Jan 01, 1961 to Aug 14, 1974 for service during the Vietnam War.

As of 2005, it is the oldest service medal which is still issued to the active military.

Note: Bronze Star Device.

Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross Medal w/Palm 1959 - 30 Apr 1975



<u>Criteria:</u> A military decoration of South Vietnam established in August 1950.

Awarded to any US military personnel Who have accomplished deeds of valor or displayed heroic conduct while fighting an enemy force.

The medal is issued in four degrees with the basic medal followed by higher degrees the result of personal citations on an organizational level (also known as having been "mentioned in dispatches.")

The devices to the Gallantry Cross are not worn simultaneously but instead are upgradeable to the next higher device which would replace the previous device for wear on the decoration.

The most common award is the Republic of Vietnam (RVN) Gallantry Cross Medal w/Palm, the individual award version.

Note: This service ribbon is issued by the military along with an accompanying medal.



United States Air Force Vietnam Service Medal 1959 - 30 Apr 1975



<u>Criteria:</u> Awarded to any service member who served more than thirty consecutive days, or sixty days that were non-consecutive days, in the Republic of Vietnam between the dates of Nov 15, 1961 and Mar 28, 1973 and from April 29, 1975 to April 30, 1975.

For those service members who supported Vietnam operations from another country (such as Thailand,) the Vietnam Service Medal may be authorized if such activity was in direct Support of Vietnam Combat operations and if such combat support exceeded 30 - 60 days.

The U.S. Air Force also grants the Vietnam Service Medal for 30 - 60 days of flight missions in Vietnamese air space, even if the home base of the flight mission was not within the Republic of Vietnam.

Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal 1960 - 30 Apr 1975




<u>Criteria:</u> This medal is awarded to members of the Armed Forces of the United States who:


1. Served for 6 months in South Vietnam during the period 01 Mar 1961 and 28 Mar 1973; or

Served outside the geographical limits of South Vietnam and contributed direct combat support to the RVN Armed Forces for an aggregate of six months.

2. Only members of the Armed Forces of the United States who meet the criteria established for the AFEM (Vietnam) or Vietnam Service Medal during the period of service required are considered to have contributed direct combat support to the RVN Armed Forces; or

Did not complete the length of service required in item (1) or (2) above.
